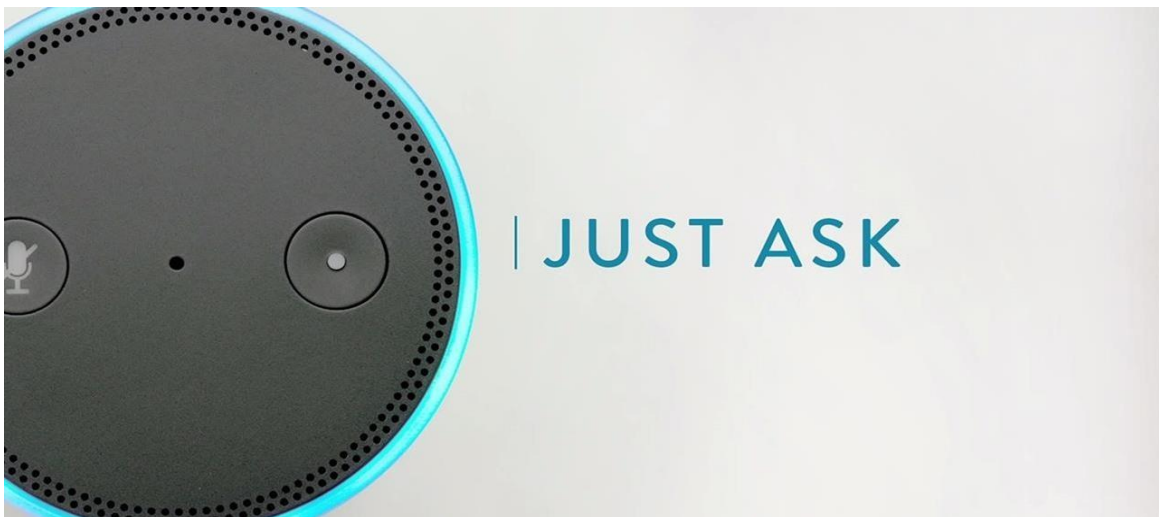

Goals and Objectives

The source of my idea came from the need to help my ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) students independently find answers to their questions during our daily differentiated instructional center time. During this time, I meet with each of my three leveled student groups differentiating their instruction to better meet their academic needs. I found myself having to interrupt the group I was meeting with to continually answer general grammar and translation questions. Many times, I had one or more students come and ask me simple questions such as: how do you spell “friends?”; or how do you say a specific word in English? At first, I would place an English/Spanish dictionary in the Writing Center, but these newly arrived second graders lack the skill to properly search the word. This would lead to frustration and giving up on the writing prompt all together. But what if there was a way that they could simply ask a question without having to continually come to me? It’s at this point where every teacher wishes they had a teacher’s assistant to help those students with questions while not interrupting the differentiated instructional center time during the Teacher Led Center. Since M-DCPS (Miami-Dade County Public Schools) does not have the budget to hire a teacher’s assistant, the Amazon Echo becomes a valuable educational tool in just about every type of classroom setting.

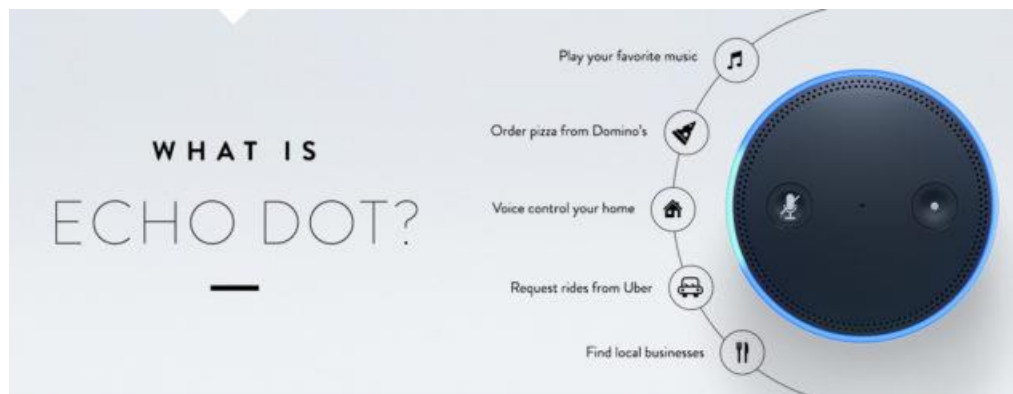

Introduction

The Amazon Echo Plus uses Alexa as a stand-alone Siri. It is a voice-controlled search device that can be asked just about anything. The Echo Dot is awakened by saying “Alexa...” then speaking a command or question. Even though the Amazon Echo was not created for the classroom, it can still provide much needed educational support by answering student questions and helping them become confident, independent individuals, who will not only succeed in school but in the real world.

According to a recent article written by Dr. Bruce Ellis (2017) in the tcea digital website, Alexa can help teachers in the classroom within a wide variety of content areas such as, reading, spelling, writing, math, social studies, and science. For example, students will be able to support their literacy by asking Alexa how to spell a specific word, provide a definition, or suggest a synonym. During math, students can use Alexa to check their work or have Alexa say how much a quarter is worth. Exploring alternative methods of instructions for our ESOL and low performing students is crucial to their understanding and grasping of educational lessons. In essence, the teacher now has a teaching assistant helping students with regular academic questions and helping the ESOL student acquire the English language.



Course Outline and Overview

There are basically only two things to keep in mind when setting up the Amazon Echo: a power source and WIFI connection. Depending on each particular classroom setting, size, and student needs, teachers can use several Echo dots in their small group centers. The closest device to the person asking the question is the device which answers. This means several devices can be running at the same time without interrupting the other small group centers.

I can have one main Echo Plus at my Teacher Led Center, and three more Echo Dot's in all the other Centers. Alexa has made a huge difference in helping my ESOL students not just acquiring the English language, but also to feel confident in writing their thoughts and ideas while increasing their vocabulary. I have been able to concentrate on my Teacher Led Center knowing that the Writing, Reading, and Word Work center is being assisted by Alexa. Using the Amazon's Echo with Alexa has truly provided my ESOL students the extra edge they need to reduce the achievement gap and help them achieve academic success.

Alexa is one of the reasons my students have become better writers, speakers and listeners. And she does this in a non-judgmental, fun, and interactive way. I have found that Alexa encourages students to become more knowledgeable about a wide variety of subjects. They love taking turns asking her questions and getting her response. Using Alexa as a teaching assistant has been instrumental in the overall academic and social aspect of my classroom environment as well as student achievement. If I had to evaluate her performance, she would definitely be given a rating of Highly Effective!

Sample Lesson

I always began the day by stating, “Alexa, good morning.” Alexa then responds by telling me a random fact related to that day in history with a funny pun or saying. It’s no wonder Alexa has become America’s favorite artificial intelligence voice. One of the main reasons why students feel comfortable and able to ask Alexa questions is because she has a sense of humor. She doesn’t question why you keep asking the same thing day after day, or why you do not know how to spell a simple word. This is why she is the perfect teacher’s assistant.

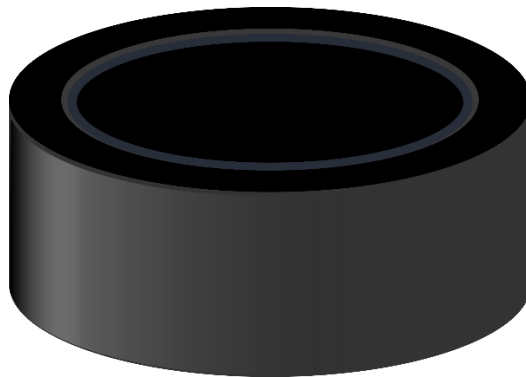
The Echo Dot is activated by saying “Alexa...” then speaking a command or question. You know she is “listening” when the device flashes blue after saying her name. She is “thinking” after you state your command or question if she continues to light up the blue green ring. In my Teacher Led Center (TLC), I worked with each of my three student groups based on their iReady (District mandated reading and math assessment and intervention program) Reading assessment scores. Differentiated instruction is then planned on a weekly basis to help each group of students advance academically. An Amazon Echo device was located in each of my four student work centers. The Amazon Echo Dot located in my TLC helped students translate, spell, or give examples of that week’s grammar targeted skill such as prefixes, suffixes, inflectional ending, singular or plural nouns and so forth. The possibilities are endless!

Within the independent student center such as the writing, word work, reading, or math students will not have to get up to ask me how to spell a word, or find the translation of a word from Spanish to English, while Alexa is with them. She will be there in every independent student center to help students with any academic questions they may have. This is actually a great habit for students and can help address speaking and listening standards in the classroom in an authentic way. Alexa encourages students to become more knowledgeable about a wide variety of subjects. Again, the possibilities are endless!

Since Alexa keeps a record of all searches, students must know that proper use of Alexa questions will be strictly enforced. Any student using inappropriate or off-topic questions will be given consequences including not being able to utilize Alexa.

Alexa Rules

1. Only one person at a time can ask Alexa a question.
2. Use Alexa as a classroom tool and not a toy.
3. Think first about the question you want answered.
4. Speak clearly using school friendly words.
5. Stay on topic.
6. Remember to always say, "Alexa" in order to wake her up.

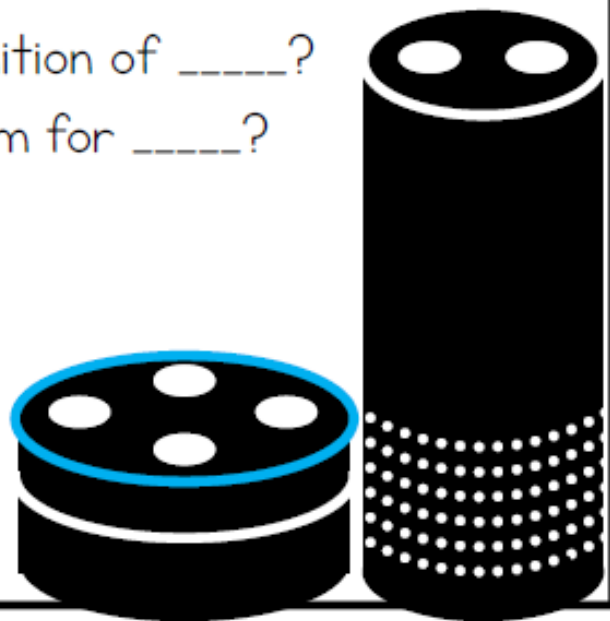
